from the Consulting Minister, Rev. Matthew Cockrum

Happy New Year! In our most recent workshop in December I gave attendees some homework, namely: sing "Spirit of Life" at least five minutes each week outside of Sunday service. Have you been doing it? If so, what have you noticed? If not, it's not too late to start!

The reasoning behind this was that the workshop focused on spiritual growth and membership. One of the critical concepts I had hoped to impart is that "growth" as a concept in congregational life is not only numerical. As a matter of fact, that is among the least interesting types of growth. While numerical growth is a reasonable goal in terms of institutional stability and impact, the idea of growth as maturation and development is even more interesting to me.

Choosing a spiritual practice such as singing a song repeatedly can be a way to seek maturation and development. Singing the same song over and over (such as when we sing rounds together in worship) is a practice in cultivating centeredness and learning to listen to what is happening beneath the surface of our lives. Where is the yearning and ache? Where is the richness and strength? Where do you come alive? Where are you in need of release and relinquishment?

For some folks the answers to these questions can create profound challenges and shifts. For some of us it may give reason to set new goals, create dream boards or vision boards, make resolutions.

My intention is that these types of questions will shape this second half of our consulting time together. We have spent the past few months looking back at the history and current condition of this congregation. Beginning in January with a Board retreat and then continuing in February with another congregational workshop, we will begin creating a plan for deepening and energizing the ministries of HUUC. Ideally this will result in a "trial run" of programming or working groups March through May. These groups (whose areas of focus are to be determined) will be operating from a renewed sense of aliveness, richness and strength. At least that's the goal. All of this will culminate in a celebration in June of what we have accomplished and a recommitment of HUUC to its future ministry - with whatever leadership makes the most sense at this time.

So...keep singing "Spirit of Life." Carve out a few minutes during your week to reflect on your life, noticing "where is there ache and yearning? Where is there richness and strength? Where do you come alive?"

And if questions come up for you in this process please send them my way! At the end of January I will be offering a "Question Box Sermon" crafted in response to questions submitted in advance from the congregation. Please email them to me (mscockrum@gmail.com) by Wednesday January 18.

December Workshop Review

On December 11, 2022, about twenty HUUC members and friends participated in a monthly Consulting Ministry workshop with Rev. Matthew Cockrum. This month the focus was on Spiritual Growth and Membership. We began the workshop by singing Spirit of Life in a contemplative fashion and then with folks checking in, sharing their names and pronouns and completing the phrases: "I was____, I am ____, and I am becoming ____." Participants were then invited to draw a timeline of their lives, noting significant religious and spiritual events or turning points (mystical experiences, initiations, transitions) and then noting events in their surrounding environments that impacted them (political, personal, developmental, etc.). Discussion at the tables focused on similarities and differences as well as themes, which included trauma and social justice issues.

The conversation and exploration continued with a presentation of a few models of spirituality and spiritual growth, one of which came from the UUA and outlined 8 different spheres of spiritual growth Handout 2: Eight Spheres of Spiritual Growth | Spirit in Practice | Tapestry of Faith | UUA.org, and the other of which was a model by Corrine Ware which illuminates our preferences for thinking, feeling, doing and being and how those inform our practices and religious lives: The Spirituality Wheel® A Spiritual Type Selector by Corinne D. Ware, D. Min. The purpose of this exercise is to DRAW A PICTURE.

We spent a bit of time talking about how HUUC handles conflict and communicates about expectations and norms. The example given had to do with the use of Joys and Concerns, how long individuals speak and what they speak about. Rev. Matthew offered the framing of thinking of Joys and Concerns in two ways: 1. Prayer requests, and 2. Tweets rather than texts. A new HUUC member who comes with years of experience in other UU settings noted that Unitarian Universalists tend to take themselves quite seriously. Another attendee voiced the opinion (which seemed echoed by many) that stretching to listen to someone whom you might otherwise not hear is a practice of HUUC embodying its mission and vision and is a rare gift in the world.

Our time wrapped up with a brainstorming session about what the surrounding community needs from HUUC, considering that "growth" is not just about gaining more members but is also about clarifying purpose, becoming more focused and honoring limitations. Rev. Matthew encouraged folks to consider the question, "Whose lives would be changed how?"

We concluded with singing Spirit of Life again and Rev. Matthew invited folks to sing this five minutes each week between this and our next workshop as a way to cultivate spiritual practice and to notice how their mind, body and spirit respond to the images and words of the song.
