November Workshop Review

About thirty HUUC members and friends joined in another monthly workshop on Sunday, November 6, in which we focused on Stewardship and finances. We began by unearthing some of our underlying

assumptions and formational experiences about money and stewardship, discovering that we have a broad range of financial backgrounds and levels of comfort (emotional and fiscal). We were able to give voice to some of our judgements and explore some of our individual histories regarding finance. Ultimately, we recognized that all of our financial situations may change over time and that where we are now does not necessarily reflect where we have come from or where we may be..

Rev. Matthew Cockrum shared some feedback and recommendations from the Unitarian Universalist Association, beginning with gratitude that for over 25 years HUUC has been an Honor Congregation, paying the amount requested annually by the UUA to support its programming. Only ten percent of congregations have this history and level of support and this is to be admired and applauded! It also entitles HUUC to a free consultation regarding stewardship which the Board and other volunteers will attend. Rev. Matthew is communicating with UUA representatives to set this up. Stay tuned for a report back!

The UUA recommended completing a quartile analysis of current giving at HUUC (a link to describing this is at the bottom of this article). With help from more mathematical minds, the final calculation of HUUC's current pledging looks like this:

Calculations modified during workshop:

November Workshop Review Continued

Overall, this is a promising picture with illumination of some areas for growth. The current median pledge is \$1200 annually and the average pledge is \$1592. A total of 25 pledge units this year represent 32 individuals who range in age from 29 to 89 (average age 52) and in membership from 60+ to 3 years (average of 19). What the quartile analysis is meant to reveal is how many people are giving at what level and if the congregation's financial health is more vulnerable due to the distribution of pledges. The Board will be taking these numbers into consideration as they plan for the 2023-2024 annual campaign.

Additional recommendations from the UUA included:

- Annual face-to-face pledge drive still the gold standard and best way to build relationships, comfort and transparency about money in congregational life.
- Focusing on what HUUC does well rather than what it has done well in the past. Some smaller
 congregations survive and thrive by being "niche" churches rather than trying to be all things to all
 people.
- Acknowledging difficulties for smaller congregations securing paid ministry due to rising expenses.
