The HUUC Social Action Committee



Feb 1, 2024

The HUUC social action Committee has been pretty active these past few months.

The **reading tutor program** for elementary students at Bunker, our neighborhood school got off the ground in December. The staff wanted to have a well organized and effective program and we reaped the benefit of that. We have 6 tutors who help three students each for 20 minutes each one day a week. We read books chosen by their teacher at their level. They read to us or we read to them, we help them sound out words and ask them questions for content. It is really very easy and the kids love the individual attention. The school is very appreciative of the help we give them. There is lots of room to grow, as so many students need help with reading and it is such a critical skill for success.

Angie did a great job with the **Christmas Families** from Every Women's Place. HUUC members were again generous with gifts to two EWP families identified as needing help. All the things requested were bought, wrapped and taken to EWP. The families were very appreciative.

The HUUC commitment to **Supper Hous**e occurs on the third Friday of the month 3:45-5. **Mary VanSlooton** coordinates this effort to try to involve more HUUC members to help serve supper at Temple United Methodist Church. Someone will show you what is expected when you show up. Residents come from the neighborhood by Muskegon Heights High School, and nearby and some are homeless. Let Mary VanSlooten or **Kwame James** know if you plan to volunteer on one of our Fridays.

We discussed the needs of HUUC members and ways they could be helped.

A printed directory of area services for the poor was being put together from an online version from EWP. **Chad** agreed to produce a document with phone numbers and addresses instead of websites. We asked the Endowment committee for \$1000 to print them, but only got half of that. Currently we have no one to continue the hard work Chad was doing, so we are putting that project on indefinite hold until we have the volunteer and financial backing to complete the project.

The HUUC social Action Committee is encouraging members to donate to MUUSJN, the "lobbiest" for UU legislative priorities. I have seen their effectiveness in supporting choice, gay rights, non-discrimination, and other UU principles. There should still be forms on the counter for donating. Any amount will help.

We also discussed inviting former members back to HUUC who were or are interested in social action. We also want to involve more of our current membership. We meet the fourth Wednesday of the month at 7:30.

Our next meeting is Feb 28 at 7:30 downstairs.

City of the Dead is an on-site outdoor **historical reenactment tour** taking place at Muskegon's Evergreen cemetery the second weekend in October annually. Rehearsals take place at Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Muskegon or at the cemetery. **Harbor UU is the sponsoring organization** for this event. The Rehearsal Director needs to be able to get to these locations.

Responsibilities will include attending meetings with the planning team starting in the spring, scheduling and managing regular rehearsals in August, September, and October with a cast of around 20-25 people (not all cast members need to be at every rehearsal) and coordinating with the tour guide group lead to make sure all cast members are well prepared for their roles as either tour stops, host ghosts, or guides. Preparing cast members and coordinating with the crew organizers for the event taking place the second weekend in October.

Because this is an all volunteer event, we are unfortunately not able to pay for this position. We wish we could, as we understand that this is a big ask of anyone who has experience in this area. Our entire cast, crew, and planning team are volunteers.



Statement of Commitment

We, the Board of Trustees of Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation, wholeheartedly commit to fostering a Safe Congregational Space that is unwaveringly free from harassment, abuse, and discrimination. Our primary aim is to ensure the safety, well-being, and dignity of all members, visitors, and staff.

Code of Conduct

Acceptable behavior and interactions within our congregation are grounded in respect, inclusivity, and the nurturing of a vibrant community atmosphere. We affirm the values and principles espoused by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), and we warmly welcome all individuals who share a commitment to living in harmony with these principles.

Reporting Procedures

We recognize the importance of promptly addressing any incidents of harassment, abuse, or violations of this policy. We strongly encourage anyone who witnesses or experiences such behavior to report it to the Board of Directors. Timely reporting is encouraged, and we assure confidentiality and unwavering support for those who come forward.

Protection

Above all, we empower and support individuals who have experienced harassment, abuse, or policy violations to establish and assert personal boundaries that ensure their safety. This may include asserting their right to ask the perpetrator to cease, discontinuing any interactions on social media platforms, and making the choice to disengage from the individual involved. Furthermore, we encourage our members and guests to explore all available legal avenues for protection, which may include seeking Personal Protection Orders or other legal remedies.

Statement of Inclusion, Diversity, and Non-Discrimination

Inclusion, diversity, and non-discrimination are not only fundamental principles of our faith but also the cornerstone of this policy and our communal interactions. We affirm our commitment to embracing and celebrating the rich tapestry of humanity.
