One of the best feelings I have had is a great sense of awe in a moment of time where I realize that I am a part of something much bigger, much greater, and much more amazing than my day-to-day conscious mind usually lets me acknowledge. That is an experience I have been able to share several times with other participants of **General Assembly**. And you have that opportunity too! I hope you will give serious consideration to joining in "GA".

The General Assembly of our Unitarian Universalist Association is <u>June 20-2</u>3. This year it will be a virtual assembly so **no travel will be required!** We need delegates to represent HUUC. (The Board of Trustees has set aside registration fees for two delegates on a first come, first served basis!). Registration fee rates will raise on <u>March 16</u> and again on <u>May</u> 15.

General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles. You'll leave with renewed energy and innovative ideas to share with our congregation and community-at-large!


The votes that GA delegates cast have a huge impact on Unitarian Universalism. This year there will be a **vote on proposed changes** to the section of the Unitarian Universalist Association bylaws that includes the Principles, Purposes, and Sources. There will also be votes to determine our elected leaders, and shape the justice work that we do as a movement. If you are interested in serving as a delegate from our congregation, talk to a Board of Trustees member (Poppy Hernandez, Jones Barton, Robin Dennany, Rebecca St. Clair, Kal Fox, or Carolyn Holmes). **You can learn more at www.uua.org/ga**.

In addition to General Assembly, the **governance of our congregation** is also a matter to be reflected upon at this time of year. Soon we will be planning a budget for the next fiscal year and preparing to hold our **annual meeting** where we will vote to fill vacancies on the Board of Trustees. Our Leadership Development Committee is currently in the process of seeking out candidates. If approached to serve, please give it your utmost consideration.

Another important very important development for the Board is the resolve to serve our families that attend HUUC. You may have noticed that we now have a group of children who attend frequently. They deserve a Sunday morning experience appropriate to their age and interest level. Those of us who have had children involved in past Religious

Education programming at HUUC know how valuable it is to families trying to raise UU kids in a very Christian oriented community at large. We will be holding a planning meeting to determine what type of programming we can offer to our young families that goes beyond "child care". This will not be a curriculum planning meeting but a discussion about what a program at HUUC would consist of. Will it be classes? Will it be more of a social gathering? Will it take place before services? After services? During Services? What has worked in the past? What has not worked? Can we do this with volunteers? IF you have been involved in Religious Education in the past or have ideas to share or wish to be involved, please plan to attend a meeting to be held following the worship service on Sunday, March 17.





City of the Dead is an on-site outdoor **historical reenactment tour** taking place at Muskegon's Evergreen cemetery the second weekend in October annually. Rehearsals take place at Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Muskegon or at the cemetery. **Harbor UU is the sponsoring organization** for this event. The Rehearsal Director needs to be able to get to these locations.

Responsibilities will include attending meetings with the planning team starting in the spring, scheduling and managing regular rehearsals in August, September, and October with a cast of around 20-25 people (not all cast members need to be at every rehearsal) and coordinating with the tour guide group lead to make sure all cast members are well prepared for their roles as either tour stops, host ghosts, or guides. Preparing cast members and coordinating with the crew organizers for the event taking place the second weekend in October.

Because this is an all volunteer event, we are unfortunately not able to pay for this position. We wish we could, as we understand that this is a big ask of anyone who has experience in this area. Our entire cast, crew, and planning team are volunteers.

Safe Congregation Policy Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation

Statement of Commitment

We, the Board of Trustees of Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation, wholeheartedly commit to fostering a Safe Congregational Space that is unwaveringly free from harassment, abuse, and discrimination. Our primary aim is to ensure the safety, well-being, and dignity of all members, visitors, and staff.

Code of Conduct

Acceptable behavior and interactions within our congregation are grounded in respect, inclusivity, and the nurturing of a vibrant community atmosphere. We affirm the values and principles espoused by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), and we warmly welcome all individuals who share a commitment to living in harmony with these principles.

Reporting Procedures

We recognize the importance of promptly addressing any incidents of harassment, abuse, or violations of this policy. We strongly encourage anyone who witnesses or experiences such behavior to report it to the Board of Directors. Timely reporting is encouraged, and we assure confidentiality and unwavering support for those who come forward.

Protection

Above all, we empower and support individuals who have experienced harassment, abuse, or policy violations to establish and assert personal boundaries that ensure their safety. This may include asserting their right to ask the perpetrator to cease, discontinuing any interactions on social media platforms, and making the choice to disengage from the individual involved. Furthermore, we encourage our members and guests to explore all available legal avenues for protection, which may include seeking Personal Protection Orders or other legal remedies.

Statement of Inclusion, Diversity, and Non-Discrimination

Inclusion, diversity, and non-discrimination are not only fundamental principles of our faith but also the cornerstone of this policy and our communal interactions. We affirm our commitment to embracing and celebrating the rich tapestry of humanity. We are resolute in our stance against discrimination based on race, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, ability, socioeconomic status, or any other characteristic. We pledge to create a community where every individual is valued and respected, and where their unique contributions enrich our shared experience.
