Holiday Greetings,

As we start the new year, your HUUC Board of Trustees are optimistic that 2025 will be an exceptional year at Harbor! Our entire congregation can take pride in knowing that half way through fiscal year 2024-2025, we are projecting a \$6,000.00 budget surplus. Thank you to all friends and members for your enduring support of our liberal congregation.

Effective immediately, the HUUC Board has posted a position opening for a Religious Education Director. This is in direct response to an appeal from the congregation. We anticipate receiving all applications by mid-January and hopefully filling the RE Director position by early February.

In addition, HUUC is actively searching for a part time Minister. Congregational President Kal Fox has spoke with UUA Congregational Life Consultant Rev. Phil Lund. He has provided two action steps for the HUUC Board to complete:

- 1. Compile a list of attributes required of a minister
- 2. Reach out to the Meadville Lombard Theological Seminary to inquire if any current students or recent graduates are interested in working with HUUC.

The Harbor Board of Trustees are actively working on both recommendations.

A HUUC Endowment Grant was generously extended to the HUUC Board to continue with a sanctuary lighting upgrade & improvement project. We are grateful to **Jeff Ochsner**, **Jim Stier**, **Jones Barton** and others for their invaluable work to shine light upon our sanctuary.

We are optimistic that 2025 will allow HUUC a grand opportunity to thrive.

On Being UU

The worship committee plans our services each week by making very intentional choices regarding each element of the service that you experience. This is an attempt to explain one segment of our worship tradition:

Why do we have "Joys and Concerns" as a part of our worship services?

In our UUA purposes and principles we affirm and promote respect for "the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part". To exercise our affirmation of this principle, each Sunday we exert an effort to deepen and strengthen our connections to one another by sharing our "Joys and Concerns". This has become a tradition in many UU churches and it takes various forms. At HUUC we invite all who wish to participate to step forward and briefly express their deeply personal joys or sorrows (In larger congregations this is not often possible due to time constraints so the verbal expression is omitted or submitted in writing to a reader who delivers it to the congregation). Often this is followed by a time of meditation in the form of song, reading or silence. At HUUC we often sing hymn #123 "Spirit of Life".

We use a bowl of sand and offer feathers and stones to represent our joys and sorrows. Feathers often represent the lighter feeling that sharing a joy can bring, while the stones placed in the sand can represent the laying down of a burden. If desired, we express our joys and sorrows by verbally sharing them with one another. "For we believe that a joy that is shared is enhanced while a sorrow that is shared may be diminished." If a joy or sorrow needs to be shared without verbal expression, that is ok too. "Joys and Sorrows" can be a time to put our wishes out into the universe. Some may think of it as a prayer request.

This ritual is a way we take care of each other by listening respectfully, and later, offering comfort when we know that someone is going through a difficult time. For those who share their joys and sorrows, this may often be the only place where such thoughts and feelings can be expressed because we don't often get that opportunity in our weekday worlds. Participating in Joys and Concerns can sometimes require us to be vulnerable and it is the safety of the congregation and the sanctuary that makes this possible. This is a sacred space and time.

We hope to maintain a sense of safety by remembering that this is a time for sharing deeply *personal* thoughts and feelings. We ask that the Joys and Concerns time <u>not be used</u> as a platform for sharing information that would be better shared in another way or in another place. Political opinions may be better received when expressed in the social hall during our fellowship time. Announcements should be made during the early portion of the service or following the service in the social hall. Church "business" that needs to be shared can often take place in the appropriate meeting.

Sharing our joys and our sorrows and expressing gratitude each week can often be the most profound part of our worship service. We welcome guests and visitors as well as our members to take part.

HUUC Social Action Committee

- 1. HUUC will be sending 3 reading tutors to Bunker and Marquette after the new year. They help one or more students once a week for the rest of the school year. Materials will be provided and the process is easy. Tutors get as much out of it as the tutors. If you are interested in joining us, contact Marcia Hovey-Wright 231 740 8492 before Tuesday January 7 when we meet with their staff.
- 2. HUUC sends a few volunteers every month to Temple United Methodist Church (2500 Jefferson St, Muskegon Heights) to serve hot meals to the community. Kwame James, Scott and Mary VanSlooten are the most regular and others go as well. Let Kwame or Mary know and show up at 3:00 and they will show you the ropes.
- 3. We have talked about promoting gun safety legislation, especially banning assault weapons, for a while. We participated in the /cooperating Churches Walk for ending gun violence for 2 years. The State passed many gun safety laws about safe storage, child safety locks, red flag laws while the Democrats had control of the House, Senate and Governor. But that ended with the election. We decided to research the 12 states that banned assault weapons for strategies to participate in a ballot initiative. Currently there are no known efforts in Michigan to ban assault weapons by citizens initiative, but that could change and we will follow it.
- **4.** Marcia has been in touch with local entities and statewide Planned Parenthood of Michigan officials. There have been several possible opportunities, but currently Planned Parenthood is focusing on surviving the incoming administration and wants to take a 6 month pause and regroup in May.
- 5. Alzheimer's Walk HUUC assisted Sue McIntire's walk and raised \$750
- **6.** Angle Barnes and Arionna Huffman chaired the **Every Woman's Place** Christmas Family effort. We were successful in meeting the needs of our family. The gifts were delivered and happily received by the mother.
- 7. This committee submitted an endowment request for a food truck with Cooperating Churches and financial help for Muskegon students attending the Civic Theater production of "Clickity Clack". The Endowment funded a food truck (date to be determined) for up to \$1000 and buying the book "Clickety Clack" for 40 kids at Muskgon Public Schools for \$400.
- **8.** At our last meeting we decided to encourage HUU members to help writing postcards to elected officials (mostly federal) on various issues every Friday from 3-5 at the CIO on West Western. Susan Fabrick, the new chair of the county Democratic Party, will provide direction and organization

We meet at 7:30 on the 3rd or 4th Wednesday (depending on holidays) downstairs. We would love to welcome new members. The nest meeting will be held, however, on Wednesday February 5, due to availability of active members.

Safe Congregation Policy Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation

Statement of Commitment

We, the Board of Trustees of Harbor Unitarian Universalist Congregation, wholeheartedly commit to fostering a Safe Congregational Space that is unwaveringly free from harassment, abuse, and discrimination. Our primary aim is to ensure the safety, well-being, and dignity of all members, visitors, and staff.

Code of Conduct

Acceptable behavior and interactions within our congregation are grounded in respect, inclusivity, and the nurturing of a vibrant community atmosphere. We affirm the values and principles espoused by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), and we warmly welcome all individuals who share a commitment to living in harmony with these principles.

Reporting Procedures

We recognize the importance of promptly addressing any incidents of harassment, abuse, or violations of this policy. We strongly encourage anyone who witnesses or experiences such behavior to report it to the Board of Directors. Timely reporting is encouraged, and we assure confidentiality and unwavering support for those who come forward.

Protection

Above all, we empower and support individuals who have experienced harassment, abuse, or policy violations to establish and assert personal boundaries that ensure their safety. This may include asserting their right to ask the perpetrator to cease, discontinuing any interactions on social media platforms, and making the choice to disengage from the individual involved. Furthermore, we encourage our members and guests to explore all available legal avenues for protection, which may include seeking Personal Protection Orders or other legal remedies.

Statement of Inclusion, Diversity, and Non-Discrimination

Inclusion, diversity, and non-discrimination are not only fundamental principles of our faith but also the cornerstone of this policy and our communal interactions. We affirm our commitment to embracing and celebrating the rich tapestry of humanity.
