General Assembly 2025

From June 18–22, 2025, the 64th UUA General Assembly will be a multi-platform event, with the main stage hosted at the Baltimore Convention Center in Baltimore, Maryland and hundreds more joining on the Whova app.

General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), where participants gather to worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy decisions for the Association through a democratic process. While anyone can attend, congregations must certify annually to have voting delegates.

News from the Director of Religious Education

March 2025 Religious Education Updates

Hello Harbor Unitarian Universalist family. It is my pleasure to be able to introduce myself as **HUUC's new RE coordinator!** I am excited to take on this role and have big goals for our RE program at HUUC.

A lot has been going on behind the scenes since I accepted this role at the start of February. If you've been downstairs, you may have noticed some rearranging of our lower level spaces. We've started the transition to having a little more structure in our Sunday morning youth offerings as well. From creating aspirational documents and starting to map out our programming year to inventorying supplies and curriculum, a lot of less-visible work on the back end has been going into getting this program restarted and off the ground.

One significant visible thing we are bringing back in March: our Noisy Offering! Bring your loose change to church the first Sunday of the month and we will take up a collection to benefit our RE program. The money collected will go towards supplies, curriculum, and other programmatic needs.

We also are in need of some basic classroom supplies: crayons, markers, colored pencils, pencil sharpeners, erasers, construction paper, and other craft supplies are all consumable materials that our youth will use regularly. If you would like to donate any of these or other creative materials, we will have a collection box in the Fellowship Hall where you can leave items.

We are working towards a number of fun opportunities, starting with our Sunday

morning youth offerings, that include everything from our older youth decorating their classroom to our RE Sunday (which, after talking to our kids today, is going to be a ton of fun to work with them to plan-stay tuned for updates and ways to be involved!)

In order to best understand the needs of our congregation, I have put together a needs assessment survey. This covers youth RE programming, adult RE programming, and nursery care. I would love to see a high percentage of our congregants respond to this so I can have the best idea possible of our congregational needs.

If you would rather fill this out by hand, we will hopefully have printed copies available next week in the Fellowship Hall. There is also a QR code that leads to this link on the bulletin board if you would like to scan it with your device the next time you are at the church.

With my experience as a youth development professional, this program may be structured a little more formally than what we've had in quite a while, but I'm looking forward to working alongside parents, volunteers, and participants (youth to adult) to make this transition as smooth as possible. We'll undoubtedly come up against a few growing pains, but I'm sure that so long as we keep Love at the Center, we're going to build something incredibly *fun* together!

On Being UU

The worship committee plans our services each week by making very intentional choices regarding each element of the service that you experience. This is an attempt to explain one segment of our worship tradition:

Why do we have a "Flaming Chalice" as a part of our worship services?

"We gather this hour as people of faith, with joys and sorrows, gifts and needs.

We light this beacon of hope, sign of our quest for truth and meaning

In celebration of the life we share together." ~Singing the Living Tradition #448 Christine Robinson

Around the world there are universal archetypes for our religions and spirituality. Some symbols are well known and understood in our culture, some not so well known, and some are just misunderstood.

The flaming chalice is the symbol of the Unitarian Universalists. A flame within a chalice (a cup with a stem and foot) is a primary symbol of the Unitarian Universalist faith tradition. Many of our congregations kindle a flaming chalice in gatherings and worships and feature the chalice symbol prominently.

The flaming chalice symbol emerged as a Unitarian symbol with the Unitarian Service Committee during World War II. The image had connotations of sacrifice and love. Unitarian Universalists today have many different interpretations of the flaming chalice, including the light of reason, the warmth of community, and the flame of hope.

Initially the image of the flaming chalice in a circle was just that: a printed, graphic, two-dimensional

image used for stationery correspondence to make the USC appear more organized and professional. After the joining of Unitarians and Universalists, the graphic evolved into two intersecting circles. Eventually the image manifested in three dimensions, becoming an actual physical chalice, flame-lit, within a circle: "A Cup of Light"

It is said it started in the 1970's with our UU Children lighting a chalice in Sunday School, bringing it to intergenerational programming, and spreading from there... to all UU congregations, all UU meetings, all ages, across the world.

The representations of the chalice are many, varying in sizes, shapes, and colors - just like our members, the work we do, and our congregations.

At HUUC you will see the chalice we light each Sunday and at meetings to signal our coming together. You will see the chalice we light for the prayers of Peace and Justice we lift into the world. You will see our chalice of sand cradling our Joys & Sorrows. And of course, you will see it in our graphics.

"We extinguish this flame but not the light of truth, the warmth of community, or the fire of commitment. These we carry in our hearts until we are together again."

HUUC Social Action Committee

- 1. READING TUTORS AT BUNKER This project is just getting started due to several delays from the school administration. Scott Roodvoets, Nancy Stier, Don Mangione and Marcia Hovey-Wright will be tutors this year, working one or two 45 minute shifts per week. We will be working with first graders only this year til the end of the year.
- 2. SUPPER HOUSE VOLUNTEERS Every third Friday at 3:00 HUUC has committed to supply volunteers to serve dinner to guests who show up at Temple United Methodist church. Please tell Mary VanSlooten and Kwame James if you are able to help out each month you can help out.
- 3. GUN SAFETY The committee members are researching the state citizen initiatives that have passed resolutions to ban assault weapons. Currently we know of no state efforts in Michigan about banning assault weapons or surveys of the constituents.
- **4. PLANNED PARENTHOOD** The state CEO talked with Marcia after the election and they are needing time to figure out how to deal with the services they currently have, especially the use of Emergency Contraception (Plan B). They will have lunch in May to reevaluate.
- 5. ENDOWMENT APPLICATIONS Funds to help Bunker School students was funded at \$400 and it has been spent. \$1000 was awarded for a food truck, but some reorganization is going on with Feeding America, so a date and location has not been decided.
- 6. COMMUNICATING WITH ELECTEDS Given the many attacks on our Democracy and slashing of programs we value many are asking what to do. The post card writing from church is not a current strategy.
 - a. Indivisible is having meetings on the first, third and forth Mondays at 6:00 at Samual Lutheral church on Muskegon avenue downtown. They plan demonstrations, notify citizens about Legislator Town Halls and other political activities.
 - b. 5calls is an ap you can download that is focused on communicating with your Congressman and Senators about federal issues. It provides a summary of the details on current issues (usually about 12-15), when you select one or more, it provides a short script and who to contact and their phone numbers. I suggest you add something to personalize your message. You will probably leave a message and sometimes talk to a staffer, but the calls are counted and It makes a difference when a congressperson gets over 1500 calls instead of the usual 40 per day.
 - c. Visit the facebooks of Progressive Democratic Women's Caucus and the Muskegon County Democratic Party for more information.
- 7. UPCOMING EVENTS –Peoples March 8, 12 noon, starting tba, ending in Hackley Park protest about human rights violations of the current administration. look for location in Facebook events.

Our meetings are changed to the 2nd Sunday after church around 12:00 at the big table in the Social hall.

Statement of Commitment

Our primary aim is to ensure the safety, well-being, and dignity of all members, visitors, and staff.

Code of Conduct

Acceptable behavior and interactions within our congregation are grounded in respect, inclusivity, and the nurturing of a vibrant community atmosphere. We affirm the values and principles espoused by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), and we warmly welcome all individuals who share a commitment to living in harmony with these principles.

Reporting Procedures

We recognize the importance of promptly addressing any incidents of harassment, abuse, or violations of this policy. We strongly encourage anyone who witnesses or experiences such behavior to report it to the Board of Directors. Furthermore, we encourage our members and guests to explore all available legal avenues for protection, which may include seeking Personal Protection Orders or other legal remedies.
