News from the Director of Religious Education July 2025 Religious Education Updates

Hello, Harbor UU Friends!

Our first week of "World of Wonder" introduced our kids to the concept of interdependence in nature and started our youth creating a covenant together, an agreement for behaviors during our lessons. We've had a few hiccoughs getting those expectations established, but we're working on it together. The covenant has been added to our Google Classroom site in the "RE Projects" section. In case you don't have access to that site, this is what they contributed together:

Our second week of "World of Wonder" happened after RE Sunday. This past week, we learned about partnerships in nature and expanded our understanding of the relationships between creatures, plants, and fungi that depend on each other for survival. Materials for this lesson have also been added to our Google Classroom. If you would like to continue this exploration at home, the UUA provides a "Taking it Home" page for this curriculum that recaps the theme and offers ways to bring conversations about these partnerships home.

RE Sunday was a rousing success with all our kids engaged in some way or another in the ways they were comfortable throughout the service. I have received nothing but good feedback for it so far and everyone I've talked to was impressed by our kids' willingness to be involved and their enthusiasm for the roles they took on. We are going to try to go back to having these multigenerational services where youth have opportunities to engage once a quarter. This used to be a regular event at HUUC and it is wonderful to resurrect this tradition! I will be working with the Worship Committee to identify when we can put together our next multigen Sunday.

Youth are encouraged to take on parts in our regular services as well--the opportunity is open for youth to light our candles and if anyone is interested in taking on readings, such as our chalice lighting or our peace and justice candle reading, all they have to do is ask! I have also been forwarded an opportunity for UU middle school youth (grades 6th-9th) to attend a retreat at Mystic Lake Camp October 17th-19th. The details have been uploaded to our Google Classroom and are in the PDF flier attached to this email. I will also have printed copies on Sunday. There are not scholarships available, so if cost is a barrier, please reach out and we can try to find a way to creatively fund attendance (perhaps there are people in the congregation willing to sponsor youth to go!)

If you have not yet joined our Google Classroom and would like to, there are a few different ways to do so. You can follow this link to join HUUC RE Classroom. If you are already on Google Classroom, you can use the class code to join--it is 4zbimzms. Or you can use the QR code attached to this email to access the join link from your phone or tablet. I am using Google Classroom to post weekly lesson materials, plan outlines, and hand-outs as well as the information on other opportunities also included in this email and photographs of our kids' projects. It's one more way to keep up on things going on and to be able to do activities at home if there's a week missed that you'd like to do at home (or activities they enjoy and want to share with you!)

I am also starting to use Google Calendar to keep track of my office hours at HUUC and the RE opportunities planned. While it's fairly bare-bones at present, I am hoping we can use it more frequently as we expand our offerings for adults and make bigger plans with our kids! We also now have a supply donation box in the Fellowship Hall–in your spring cleaning, if you come across craft supplies you don't have a use for, leftover classroom materials, hobbies that just didn't take off, or other items you think our RE kids could use, please feel free to drop them in the box. We are always looking for consumables, such as markers, paints, crayons, pipe cleaner, feathers, and other supplies, as well as other nifty things our kids might enjoy using in their RE classes or for decorating their classroom spaces. We have a crafty, hands-on group of youth and donations will be well-used!

The QR code linking to it is still present in the Fellowship Hall on the bulletin board. The more people who fill it out, the better I will be able to get a feel for the needs and wants of the congregation as we plan future youth and adult offerings.



I would love to start some short-term adult enrichment programming over the summer, so please make sure to fill out the survey so I know what direction folks want to go in and who is eager to lead one of these adult offerings.

On Being UU

The worship committee plans our services each week by making very intentional choices regarding each element of the service that you experience. This is an attempt to explain one segment of our worship tradition:

Why do we **Sing In Church** as a part of our worship services?

Singing in church serves several meaningful purposes across different dimensions of human experience:

****Community and Connection****

For many of us singing is not our most comfortable form of expression. In fact, several of you have shared with me stories of your childhood when you were told not to sing. But singing together at church creates a powerful sense of unity and shared experience. When our voices blend in harmony, it breaks down individual barriers and fosters a feeling of belonging to something larger than ourselves. This communal aspect strengthens bonds between us and creates lasting connections.

****Emotional Expression****

Music has a unique ability to convey emotions that words alone cannot capture. Singing allows us to express devotion, gratitude, joy, or contemplation in ways that feel more complete and heartfelt. Many find it easier to connect with their faith through melody and rhythm.

Stress Relief and Well-being

Singing has documented psychological and physical benefits, including reduced stress, improved breathing, and the release of endorphins. In a church setting, this contributes to an overall sense of peace and well-being that many of us associate with our spiritual practice.

****Active Participation****

Rather than being passive observers, singing transforms us into active participants in the service, making the experience more engaging and personally meaningful.



And on a lighter note, I've heard UUs are notoriously poor singers... because they're always reading two lines ahead to makes sure they agree with the words.

If you're having an issue with language in our music, my motto is always, "If you can't sing it for yourself, sing it for someone else.

Come sing with us on Sunday, July 27. We typically don't meet in the summer, but we are adding this one so we can sing about Freedom & Democracy. 


Welcome New Members!

If you haven't met them yet, please introduce yourself to these wonderful people!



2025 ANNUAL REPORT

- 1. READING TUTORS AT BUNKER This project is didn't get started until March due to several delays from the school administration, but four members have been tutoring weekly until the end of school. Scott Voodvoets, Nancy Stier, Don Mangione and Marcia Hovey-Wright will be tutors this year, working one or two 45 minute shifts per week and helping 3 students each time. The students love the induvial attention and work hard.
- 2. ENDOWMENT APPLICATIONS the Social Action applied for funds to help Bunker school and we received \$400 for **book**s related to a musical they attended at the Frauenthall. We also were awarded \$1000 for a **food truck** at First Congregational Church. We also provided 10 volunteers to join with their volunteers to staff the food truck distribution. They were very grateful for the donation and volunteers. We are too small to do one ourselves and don't have the equipment or expertise.
- 3. COMMUNICATING WITH ELECTEDS Given the many attacks on our Democracy and slashing of programs we value many are asking what to do.
 - a. **Indivisible** is having meetings on the first, third and forth Mondays at 6:00 at Samual Lutheral church on Muskegon avenue downtown. They plan demonstrations, notify citizens about Legislator Town Halls and other political activities.
 - b. Scalls is an ap you can download that is focused on communicating with your Congressman and Senators about federal issues. It provides a summary of the details on current issues (usually about 12-15), when you select one or more, it provides a short script and who to contact and their phone numbers. We suggest you add something to personalize your message. You will probably leave a message and sometimes talk to a staffer, but the calls are counted and It makes a difference when a congressperson gets over 1500 calls instead of the usual 40 per day.
 - c. Visit the facebooks of Progressive Democratic Women's Caucus and the Muskegon County Democratic Party for more information. They recruit local candidates and help them get elected.
- 4. PRIDE FESTIVAL HUUC is again participating is Pride Festival. We will have a group in the parade and a booth with our HUUC materials and givaways.
- 5. SUPPER HOUSE VOLUNTEERS Every third Friday at 3:00 HUUC has committed to supply volunteers to serve dinner to guests who show up at Temple United Methodist church. We have not been successful in getting volunteers regularly so we need to revaluate this commitment.
- 6. GUN SAFETY we planned to do research on states that banned assault weapons, but when Trump got elected there were too many other more urgent issues to address, so we put that project on hold.
- 7. PLANNED PARENTHOOD Planned parenthood closed several clinics statewide and is transitioning to virtual services, so it is unlikely that they will be able to fiancé opening a clinic in Muskegon. The current administration is targeting Planned Parenthood for defunding.
- 8. Our meetings will go back to the 4th Wednesday at 7:30 in the big room downstairs unless otherwise advertised. We welcome new members to the committee. The next meeting will be June 25, 2025 at 7:30.

Statement of Commitment

Code of Conduct
